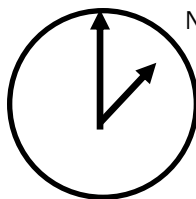

Priorities

It's not often the Des Moines Register has a front-page, above-the-fold, HUGE, color headline which begins, "Dear God...". It got my attention.

Then it got a heavy sigh from me. The accompanying article informed me the "Pulpit Freedom" folks are rising up once again, taunting the Internal Revenue Service (IRS) by clearly violating the 1954 ruling which prohibits churches and charities from participating in political activity.

This time around some conservative preachers, rallied primarily around the "judicial retention vote", are telling their parishioners to dump the three "activist judges" who voted (unanimously with their four colleagues) to allow same-sex couples to marry in Iowa. The Pulpit Freedom folks have been preaching sermons condemning the decision and the justices, and directing their flocks to vote "NO" on retaining the judges. At least some of them are then mailing copies of their sermons to the IRS to be certain the agency is aware of their actions.

Cary Gordon, who currently serves on the pastoral team of Cornerstone World Outreach in Sioux City, was the individual on the front page of the Register on October 11. His full quote was "Dear God, please allow the IRS to attack my church, so I can take them all the way to the U.S. Supreme Court."

The Pulpit Freedom group first surfaced, at least as far as I'm aware, in 2008. Thirty-three preachers nationwide signed on that year. This year their list apparently reached 100 (though at least one person said they were erroneously listed).

I'm an advocate of freedom of speech. I'm ALSO an advocate of separation of church and state. I also appreciate the tax-exempt status the IRS gives legitimate congregations which follow the necessary laws and guidelines.

In my opinion, freedom of speech does NOT mean pastors can endorse specific candidates (or parties) from the pulpit or do fundraising for candidates or parties. In my opinion, separation of church and state does NOT mean political issues are taboo in our buildings...whether in study groups, sermons or hallway discussions. Those are important, vital activities as we seek to understand how our life is connected to God, how we are connected to one another and as we seek to discern God's will for our world.

What's NOT important and certainly not appropriate, whether it's legal or not, is pastors telling parishioners how to vote! I trust your intelligence and your sensitivity to the needs of others. I also trust you will approach the voting booth in prayer.

I enjoy...no, I RELISH discussing politics and I'm not afraid of expressing my opinions. But I will NOT tell you whom to vote for.

The DM Register quoted Gordon as saying, "I don't think the IRS will do anything...I think they would rather let me blather about this...".

I can't imagine how much time, money, energy and worship hours Cary Gordon (and the handful of preachers he claims to have recruited to his cause) have spent on this. I'm glad we at Collegiate/Wesley have far more important things to do than goading the IRS or working to deny rights to others. I'm glad we're focused on things like working for the good of all people, working to deepen our relationship with God and inviting others to join us on the journey.

John Wesley – the founder of Methodism – lived by simple rules of faith to guide his own financial matters. Sometimes faith and finances seem poles apart. Yet shouldn't our finances be shaped by our faith?
