# “See You on the Seashore”

O.K., here's an unusual scripture reference for you: Jonah 2:9.

I'm sure there is someone out there who will read that first statement and think “of course, Jonah 2:9” and immediately know to what this passage refers. Good for you! For the rest of us, Jonah 2:9 reads “...I with the voice of thanksgiving will sacrifice to you; what I have vowed I will pay. Deliverance belongs to the LORD!” Or, as The Message paraphrases it, “...I'm worshipping you, GOD, calling out in thanksgiving! And I'll do what I promised I'd do! Salvation belongs to God.” (The Message)

Sounds rather pious and praiseworthy, doesn't it? Jonah is agreeing to worship, give thanks, and fulfill his promises. What a great message for around the Thanksgiving holiday. It's certainly one that the financial leadership of our congregation would appreciate after a season of stewardship messages and pledge cards.

Unfortunately, Jonah's message doesn't come from a heart filled with gratitude or even willingness. In context with what is happening in the rest of his life (he speaks these words from the belly of the fish), **and** the fact that his actual phrase starts with the word “But”, Jonah is voicing these seemingly pious words like a petulant child, a spoiled brat. Jonah doesn't get the true “thanksgiving” thing at all. In fact, the best that God gives to Jonah after his little rant is this; “Then the LORD spoke to the fish, and it vomited up Jonah on the seashore.” (v.10) Ewwww!

I know that we've all been “in the belly of the fish” at some point in our lives. The innards of your fish certainly looked different from mine, and mine from Jonah's, but we've all been there. Perhaps you might even feel like you are there now. But, like it or not, even society around us is going to drag us kicking and screaming into Thanksgiving and we get to decide how we are going to take it. Are we going to half-heartedly and petulantly participate in the holiday intentions while complaining about how “the banks are closed and we can't get any mail today”, or are we going to take an opportunity to express some real gratitude toward God? After all, we may be in the belly of the fish, but at least we're out of the water for awhile!

Melody Beattie, a counselor and self help professional, once wrote:

“Gratitude unlocks the fullness of life. It turns what we have into enough, and more. It turns denial into acceptance, chaos to order, confusion to clarity. It can turn a meal into a feast, a house into a home, a stranger into a friend. Gratitude makes sense of our past, brings peace for today, and creates a vision for tomorrow.”

During this season of Thanksgiving, may we be a people of true gratitude. May we learn to fully turn over to God that which belongs to God (everything), and have gratitude for all that God gives us in return. May we agree to worship, give thanks, and fulfill our promises. May we see that God is not placing us in the belly of the fish, God is offering a way out.

“Not that I am referring to being in need; for I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In

any and all circumstance I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need. I can do all things through him who strengthens me.” Phillipians 4:11-13

## “Finding Jesus on Broadway”

We’ve all known that Rev. Scott Grotewold has taken youth groups from across the conference on discovery trips to New York, but when he announced in the *Communicator* and bulletins a few months back that he would lead interested church members to “find Jesus on Broadway,” who knew that he would end up leading a group of 15 mostly senior citizens to New York, November 5-8? Because of Scott (& Susan’s) love of New York and their expertise—and Scott’s sabbatical there a few years back—he was able to assemble a fantastic trip at a thrifty price that was full of Jesus moments.

Some of those moments occurred on subways, or street corners, or in restaurants, or in airports; some within the group itself. Many times we told the people we met that we were a United Methodist church group being led by our pastor. That occasioned some surprised looks, but undoubtedly planted seeds.

Our primary purpose was to see and discuss three plays selected by the group: (1) “The Scottsboro Boys” had its official opening just a few days before we saw it. Based on an historical incident in 1930s Alabama and the racist trial following, it ends with a glimmer of hope as it heralds the beginning of the civil rights movement. (2) “Time Stands Still” examines the wounds of war, both psychological and emotional. The character played by Laura Linney is a photographer recently returned from Iraq. As she sees the world through a lens, we see that her lens provides a defense mechanism as well. (3) Our final play, “Billy Elliot,” is again based on an historical incident—the coal miners’ strike in Britain in 1983. Billy manages to dance his way out of the British midlands to London and into a new life. As members of the group discussed the plays, we were able to find Jesus, his teachings, and who we are called to be in several places in these widely varying productions.

In addition, we went sightseeing around the island and learned to navigate via public transportation. Of course, we also ate lots of great ethnic food. Several attended church services on Sunday morning. Serendipitously, some who did not attend church found themselves in an exhibit at the New York Public Library called “Three Faiths: Christianity, Judaism, Islam.”

An unintended consequence of the trip was the growth of relationships within our Collegiate/Wesley family. Many of us didn’t know each other all that well. Through our four days together, we learned and grew together.

CUMC/WF is a large family and we learn to nurture each other through small groups. The next time you see something “advertised” that piques your interests, respond. You might get more out of it than expected.

## You can lend a hand to a soon-to-be released prisoner

It's hard to imagine the feelings and issues of a person just out of prison. Where will I live? I need dishes and soap. How can I find a job that will accept an ex-con? Where do I get a driver's license? How do I get along on the little money I have? My teeth have not been taken care of for years. I don't know anybody in this town.

Our church is forming two aftercare support teams to "walk with" two soon-to-be released women prisoners who will be dealing with issues of re-entry.

We're looking for three kinds of people:

- (1) People with the gift of being a helpful friend who will meet regularly with one of the persons to discuss her issues and encourage her along the way,
- (2) People who have something the person might need—a room, a car, appliances, etc.—or know something that might be useful to them—how to apply for a job or manage money, fix a faucet, etc.,
- (3) People who know where to find things or access services.

Maybe you've "been there," and have survival skills to share.

Maybe you know something, or how to find something, or know somebody who might be able to help.

Maybe you don't have time to meet with the person regularly but you have a specific thing you can make available—if the person happens to need it.

Let us know of your interest and how you might be able to help.

## Film Study during Advent

### **Christianity and Homosexuality...** A Documentary Film and Discussion Series.

A film and discussion series will be held at Collegiate United Methodist Church, 2622 W. Lincoln Way, on Dec. 1, 8 and 15 at 7 p.m. in the Student Lounge, 2<sup>nd</sup> floor. Each documentary deals with the issues of Christianity and homosexuality.

- Dec. 1 "The Education of Shelby Knox" Shelby is a teenager in a county with one of the highest rates of teen pregnancy and STDs in the country. The film documents her transformation from conservative to liberal Christian and ardent feminist as she fights for sex education and gay rights in Lubbock, Texas.
- Dec. 8 "Through My Eyes" Provides an unflinchingly honest look at the role of today's young Christians in the gay debate: what they really think, how they perceive the church, and what they wish other Christians knew.
- Dec. 15 "The Bible Tells Me So" Through the experiences of five very normal, very Christian, very American families we discover how insightful people of faith handle the realization of having a gay child.
